- The European AIDS Treatment Group (EATG), founded in 1992, is a cooperative structure of people from different nationalities and communities affected by HIV/AIDS in Europe and elsewhere.
- The EATG is a registered charitable association (gemeinnütziger e.V.) under German law, with the Secretariate in Brussels, Belgium



Guiding Principles

- Be democratic and accountable, transparent and accessible to its members, people living with HIV, and their advocates
- Reflect in its membership the diversity of people living with HIV and their advocates
- Respect the *diversity* of people regarding considerations such as religion, gender, sexual preference and lifestyle.
- Work to complement and collaborate with other relevant groups
- Prioritize and regularly evaluate its activities
 acording to its objectives, cost effectiveness, and
 fairness.




EATG Mission








Europan Community Advisory Board
